Development –

Most important tasks:

- Develop emotional stability –
- Develop language and communication skills
- Develop knowledge about things and events around them
- Develop a "disposition to learn"

Action – There is NO magic age when "schooling" begins. When taught at the right time, with the right approach, learning will happen.

Learning styles –

Don't underestimate everyday life, conversation, activities, problem solving, life skills, delight!

Quick overview of learning to read (Language Arts) -

- Learn to talk
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- Pre-reading Goal: learn what reading and writing are for and that they are useful and enjoyable things to do.
 - Reading books aloud and talking about them develop:
 - Vocabulary
 - Sequencing
 - Problem solving
 - Knowledge
 - Thinking skills
 - Sentence structure
- Fluency Stage Goal: Learn to read
 - READ!!!! Practice, practice, practice
 - Reading is learned by reading

- o At least 2 years
- Easy is OK & good
- Let them devour books
- Develops:
 - Vocabulary
 - Spelling skills by seeing words often
 - Beginning writing skills
- Information Stage Goal: Read to Learn (4th-Jr. High)
 - Read for information and recreation
 - Will probably read more books during this period than any other time of life

Keeping Little Ones occupied while working or teaching olders:

- Fill their tank
- Plan their activities ahead of time
- Have special toys/games/activities and a special place
- Utilize their siblings
- Use nap time
- Use a timer
- Use a sheet as their "classroom"
- Have a bin for their "school"
