

Speaker Series



Our guest speaker on July 21,2021 was Mrs. Adrienne Barker. She has lived in Fort Bend County for 30 years and has been very active in the community both professionally and in civic volunteer work.

As a fundraising professional, she has worked for agencies including; American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, MD Anderson Cancer Center, Houston Museum of Natural Science, Houston Area Women's Center, University of Houston and the Memorial Hermann system as an Assistant Vice President.

Her current professional position is with The George Foundation, as the Site Director of George Ranch Historical Park. There she oversees all staff managing customer service, historical interpretation, school education and third party rental events.

The George Foundation invests in Fort Bend County, Texas to enhance our community and the quality of life of those in need. Through grants to local nonprofits and scholarship opportunities for aspiring local students, the Foundation strives to positively impact the lives of our neighbors.



Mrs. Barker, gave our members a fascinating talk about the history of the George Ranch back 200 years ago when first owned by **Henry and Nancy Jones**. (One of the first English speaking families in Fort Bend County). Adrienne walked us through the lineage of inheritance of all woman ownership to Mamie George who created the foundation. The land was always primarily woman owned, possibly due to Mexican influence which allowed women to inherit. If it had been under British rule it is thought that the land would have probably only passed down to men back then.

In her presentation Adrienne brought up some very interesting historical facts and thoughts on how the term cowboy originated, which are quite different from the way we see today's cowboys. Originally thought to have first been used in England around 1400 AD, many who worked with cows were boys 9-10 years old who tended herds back then. So, it is thought the term "cow boys" started with them.

Being a cowboy was a dirty nasty job in kind of a rough and tumble environment with lots of shootings and conflicts back then. But what really brought these men "together" was their skill set of rounding up cattle. Being a cowboy was considered a step-up economically as compared to being a laborer at that time in history. Today, some 100+ years later, the term cowboy is socially accepted for "skilled" cattle workers.

So, what's coming up with the George Ranch now?

There will be a **new visitors center** in about 18 months! There will also be a new **Heritage Nature Trail** within 2 years! And in 2024 there will be a **200 year anniversary celebration of the Jones family**, who as I mentioned, were one of the first English speaking families in this area we call Fort Bend County. www.thegeorgefoundation.org (for more insight)
