

They attended to accept a check for \$1,500 to support their **YEP!** Program (Youth Empowerment Planning). The YEP Program helps homeless youth in shelters.

- Summer Learning Empowerment---Helps keep homeless youths from falling behind their school peers in math and reading.
- School Needs/Empowerment---Helps to pay school fees not part of the regular curriculum such as band, club fees, and parking fees.
- Access to Laptop Computers---Allows school-age children to check out laptops from the Day Center and have access to tutors.
- Social/Behavioral Empowerment---Provides mentoring, fitness and skills training, mentorship
 and mentorship training, and tutoring to improve grades as needed. It provides full team uniforms

Speaker Series

Brooke Thompson introduced our speaker Howard Partridge. Howard grew up very poor in a little 600 square foot shack in Mobile, Alabama where there were 7 kids living. At 18, he moved to Houston with 25¢ in his pocket. He found a job as a waiter and after working for five years and getting married he used wedding cash to start his first business.

He is a very successful entrepreneur having owned nine small businesses. Howard has also written seven books about business, marketing, and success and currently owns four businesses and already seems to know quite a few of our members.

Howard's subject was "The Power of Community (How phenomenal leaders inspire their teams)".

He mentioned Victor Frankel's book <u>Man's Search for Meaning.</u> Victor was captured by the Nazis in WWII. He had a visa, a visa that would allow him to escape to freedom but he had stayed behind so he could try to protect his parents. Of course, that did not work out too well for any of them.

Frankel said that "Man's search for meaning drives us all". Howard stated that there are three things that Frankel shared that we need for meaning.

- 1. We get meaning from having a worthy project to work on---just like Exchange members. We always have a worthy project.
- 2. A redemptive view of suffering---We need to see the light at the end of the tunnel. Howard's younger brother has ALS and can only communicate by moving his eyes. He only has about six months to live and recently said about his short time, "I'm not dying, I'm just going to get to heaven faster". He can see the light at the end of the tunnel.
- 3. We need a community of love to belong to---He used a Zig Ziglar quote to define this. "You can have everything in life you want if you will just help other people get what they want." Everyone has a longing for belonging. https://howardpartridge.com/

Exchange member **Carla Mondt** introduced our speaker **Walter Ulrich** - **President & CEO of Medical Bridges**, a life-changing and life-saving non-profit serving the global poor by providing needed medical supplies and equipment to clinics and hospitals. Walter was recently named a Charity Navigator Nonprofit Advisor. He has been featured in several business publications and the Houston Business Journal.

In 1997, Houston cancer surgeon, Dr. Patricia Brock Howard, and pediatrician, Dr. Margaret Goetz, traveled to El Salvador on a medical mission. They were distressed by the resource-poor conditions under

which the local health care providers had to work. On the other hand, in the U.S. it was estimated that nearly \$6 billion in medical surplus were—discarded each year. Drs. Brock Howard and Goetz, engineer Hayne Blakely, along with other like-minded individuals, established the first medical recycling nonprofit for the Texas Medical Center. For 24 years, Medical Brides has salvaged and repurposed medical supplies and equipment from polluting our environment and instead has supplied thousands of health heroes in desperate need—of the tools to care for their impoverished communities. Medical Bridges also helps underserved rural communities in the U.S. and during disasters such as the many hurricanes we are accustomed to.

In 2020, Medical Bridges shipped 43 Containers of Hope shipped to 21 countries. Reallocated **\$7.5 million** excess medical supplies and equipment from the world's largest medical center to small underserved charitable clinics across the developing world and in the U.S. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Medical Bridges kept resilient to serve and supply healthcare heroes on the frontlines across the globe tackling healthcare disparities and the novel virus.

There are places with a desperate need for sterile gloves, incubators, basic supplies, medical equipment, and even beds to get patients off mats on the floor, and COVID-19 has made the situation worse. Ranked 6 out of 20,000 Houston area non-profits, Medical Bridges recently shipped a container with over \$210,000 worth of equipment and supplies to where it was most needed, Medical Bridges will continue to work towards its mission of Bridging the Healthcare Gap. Medical Bridges is located in Houston near Almeda and the South Loop and is always seeking volunteers. 


Contributions provide approximately 24 percent of the support the council receives each year. The success of Scouting depends on those who support it.
