Police K9 Fren "Frankie" Bednajzer 2001-2010

In 2010, the Mayville Police Department suffered the loss of K9 Frankie.

K9 Frankie began his career with the Mayville Police Department in September 2003, when he was sworn in as Mayville's first canine officer.

During his career, Frankie assisted in over 500 K9 calls in Mayville and the surrounding communities. Frankie was responsible for the seizure of over 25 pounds of marijuana, several pounds of cocaine and heroin and has made over 300 drug and criminal arrests. In addition, he apprehended numerous criminals that were attempting to evade custody. Frankie and his handler were very active in the community, conducting over 100 demonstrations and safety talks to civic groups, schools and community organizations. Frankie was truly loved by the community.

Frankie was originally purchased through donations, and the Mayville Police Department continued to raise money annually through our youth dances so no taxpayer funds were required to keep the program running.

On June 20, 2010, Frankie was diagnosed with Hemangiosarcoma, an aggressive and untreatable form of cancer. Until his diagnosis, he had been actively working with his handler Officer Ryan Vossekuil. Frankie, although sick and dying, still wanted to work. Frankie died peacefully on August 21, 2010 at his home surrounded by his family.




Officer Ryan Toellner

On April 11, 2010, at 3:30am, a passer-by found a 43 year old Juneau man badly beaten in the rear parking lot of a tavern after bar closing. The man suffered severe injuries to his face and head, including a broken eye socket. The man was unable to identify his attackers. He was transported to Beaver Dam Community Hospital. During the Initial investigation, no suspects were identified.

The next day, Officer Ryan Toellner re-interviewed the witnesses and was able to identify two suspects and subsequently obtained confessions after interviewing the suspects. Through his actions and skills as an investigator, we were able to apprehend those responsible for this violent crime and give the victim resolution. Officer Toellner received a Letter of Commendation for his outstanding dedication and professionalism in solving this case.



2010 In Review

2010 was a challenging year for the Mayville Police Department, operating at minimum staffing for the first full year, with six patrol officers and two civilian administrative assistants. The Mayville Police Department prides itself on quick response and ability to provide the highest level of service to the community. Personnel moves, such as moving the detective into patrol, helped to meet our goals and maintain police services.

Police Operating Budget


The overall 2010 operating budget for the Mayville Police Department was \$938,857.00 which was a 9.59% decrease from 2009. We went over budget by 14.95% in overtime in 2010 due to injuries and an illness.

Police Calls for Service


Overall, total calls for service in 2010 were up 8% from 2009, based on CAD reports. We did see an increase in burglaries, thefts and damage to property. Many other miscellaneous services are not identified as a Call for Service.






A breakdown of 2010 Calls for Service by shift shows that second shift officers handled the most calls for service. Second shift handled 46% of the total Calls for Service.




The graph on the left shows the Calls for Service by time of day which indicates higher calls for service between 3:00pm and 5:00pm

Index Crimes



Criminal Arrests are any arrest where state charges are filed with the District Attorney's Office. Criminal Arrests were down from the previous year. We saw a 41% decrease in Adult Criminal Arrests and a 26% decrease in Juvenile Criminal Arrests.

The Mayville Police Department reports crimes to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The following statistics are from 2009 and show other agencies similar in size and neighboring cities.





Accidents per Month





Department Training

In 2010, the police department switched from our older 9mm Beretta handgun to the .45 Cal Glock as the primary duty weapon. Each officer qualified with the new duty weapon during our in-house firearms training session conducted by our firearms instructor Officer Ryan Borchardt.

In February of 2010, the Mayville Police Department switched the squad mobile data system to the Tiburon System utilized by the other agencies in Dodge County. Switching to this system was a cost savings to the police budget. The Tiburon system allows dispatchers to send calls for service directly to the officer in the patrol vehicle. Each officer attended training on this new system.

Each officer attended their required 24 hours of in-service training which included Defense and Arrest Tactics (DAAT), Legal Update and Vehicle Pursuit Training. The officers also received 4 hours of Crash Training which included accident reconstruction, vehicle dynamics, and crash data retrieval techniques.

Officer Ryan Vossekuil also attended an annual Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) recertification training course.

Community Programs

Citizens Police Academy

An adult organization consisting of graduates of the Mayville Police Department's Citizen's Police Academy. Alumni members are responsible for donating hundreds of volunteer hours to the police department. Many former CPA members have continued to serve in various areas of local government.





Youth Dance

Since 2003, the Mayville Police Department has been sponsoring a youth dance at the Mayville Park Pavilion as a fundraiser for the department. The dances provide a safe environment for children to go and have fun with a DJ and concessions.

The dances are chaperoned by the Mayville Police Department and the Citizen's Police Academy Alumni.

Bicycle Safety

Each summer, the Mayville Police Department conducts a bicycle safety program called a "Bike Rodeo". Officers and volunteers provide safety instruction to young children, provide helmets to those children who need them, and provide free bicycle registration. We teach children the importance of bicycling safely in the City.

Hunter's Site-In Clinic

Each November, the Mayville Police Department opens its firearms range to the public to allow hunter's a safe environment to site in their rifles prior to deer season. A police firearms instructor is on hand to provide guidance and instruction to those that may need it.

The Mayville Police Department is a proud member of the Shop with Cops organization that is designed to help effect a beneficial change in our youth by teaching respect, building trust and friendship, and instilling values. Each year, officers donate their time to spend it with children.
