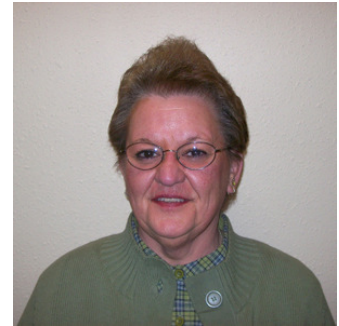

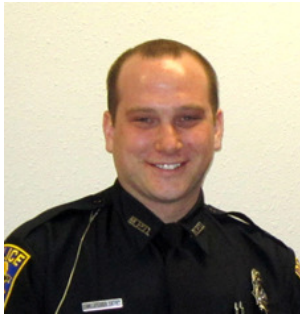

Prescription drug abuse is currently being reported by law enforcement agencies across the country as their greatest threat. In addition, unsafe disposal of prescription and over-the-counter medications is costly to the environment.

These unused drugs present opportunities for environmental contamination, drug abuse and accidental poisonings.

To combat the illicit use of prescription medications and protect the environment, the Mayville Police Department provides citizens with a safe and easy way to dispose of all expired, unused or unwanted medications.

Citizens can dispose of expired, unused or unwanted medication in the drug drop off box located in the interior lobby of the police department. It is open to the public Monday - Friday from 8:00am - 4:30pm.

In 2013, The Mayville Police Department collected over 70 pounds of unwanted and expired prescription drugs.

The program, which was started in 2012, has so far collected over 126 pounds of prescription drugs that would have otherwise gone into a landfill or into the city water system.

Non-prescription medications, vitamins and veterinary meds are accepted.

2013 EVENTS

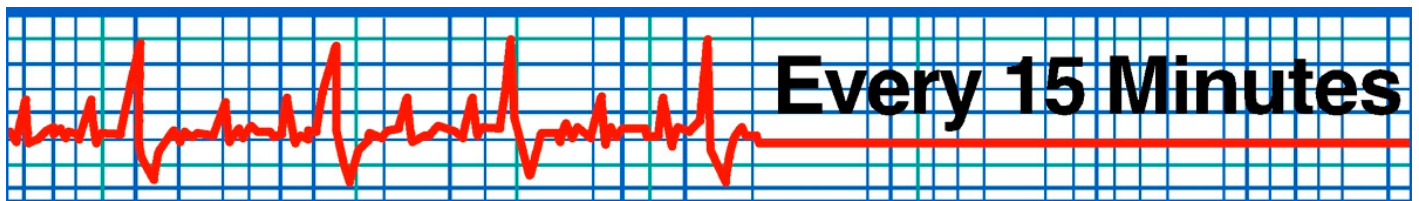

The Mayville Police Department assisted Mayville EMS with their "Every 15 Minutes" program which is designed to instill teenagers with the potentially dangerous consequences of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. As part of the program, the Mayville Police Department provided assistance with reading student obituaries and responding to and investigating a mock accident involving a student who was driving under the influence of a controlled substance.

The program, which is geared to provide real-life experiences without the real-life risks, took place on Clark Street in front of the Mayville High School.



Police Officers assisted with victims, investigated the crash scene, and simulated an arrested of a teenager for operating while impaired. Multiple agencies assisted with the program which made a huge impact on the student body.

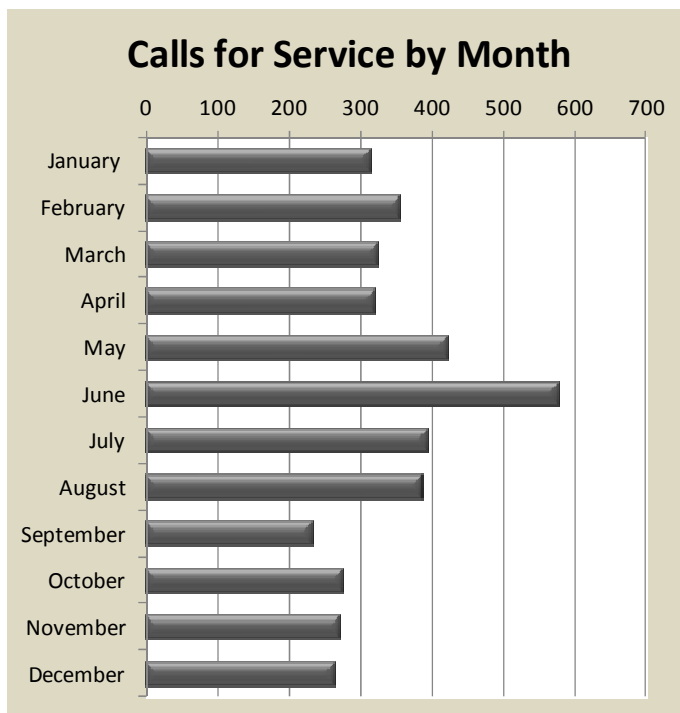

Overall, total calls for service in 2013 were up 2.15% from 2012.



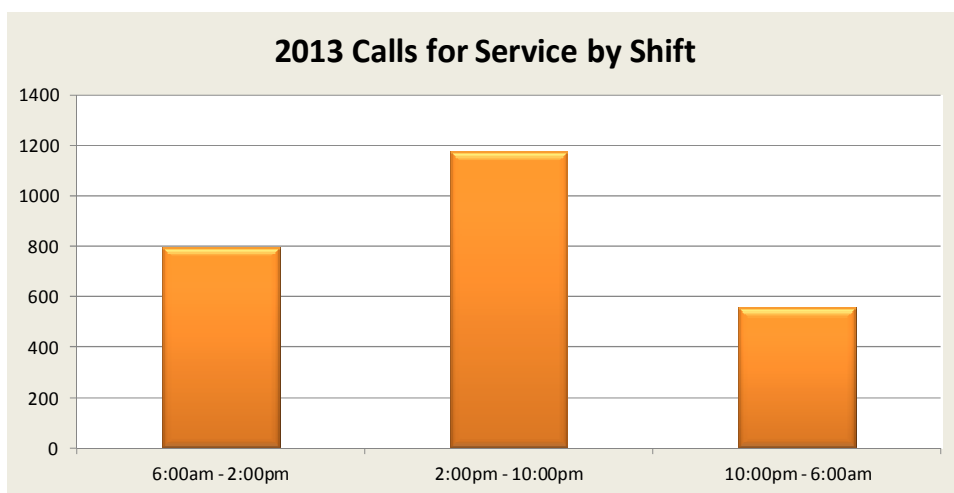
**Many other miscellaneous services are not identified as a Call for Service.*

2013 MOTOR VEHICLE CRASH BREAKDOWN

In 2012, there were a total of 109,385 traffic crashes in Wisconsin. 39,370 people were injured and 601 people died on Wisconsin roadways. Crashes are not accidents, but avoidable events caused by a single variable or chain of variables. The Mayville Police Department works diligently throughout the year utilizing traffic campaigns to educate the public and ultimately reduce the number of crashes in the city.

In addition to routine traffic enforcement, the Mayville Police Department participates in statewide traffic campaigns such as “Click It or Ticket” and “Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over” in an effort to promote safe driving and reduce the number of injuries and fatalities on our roadways.

Safety Campaigns

Each year, the Mayville Police Department joins other agencies around the state in several Traffic Safety Campaigns in order to educate the public and reduce fatalities on Wisconsin Roads.



Click It or Ticket

Officers enforce Wisconsin's mandatory seat belt law in an effort to convince everyone to buckle up voluntarily so that eventually we can reduce the number of preventable traffic deaths to zero in Wisconsin.



Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

Officers were out in force along with agencies across the Nation to crackdown on drunk drivers. The object was to deter people from getting behind the wheel when they were not sober.

Building relationships

The Mayville Police Department is about building relationships. We continue to build and strengthen our relationships with the community through programs meant to foster the idea of helping others.

POLICE YOUTH DANCES

In 2013, the Police Department held six dances at the Pavilion for local teens. The dances provide a safe environment for children to go and have fun with a DJ and concessions. Each dance is chaperoned by police staff and the proceeds go towards the departments K9 program.

POLICE INTERNSHIP

The Mayville Police Department has partnered with Marian University in Fond du Lac to provide internships to students completing a degree in criminal justice. The internship is a volunteer position and provides students with knowledge and experience in the field of law enforcement.

HUNTER'S SITE-IN CLINIC

Each November, the Mayville Police Department opens its firearms range to the public to allow hunters a safe environment to site in their rifles prior to deer season. A police firearms instructor is always on hand to ensure safe operation and provide guidance and instruction to those who may need it.
